

SCAD study abroad programs provide students with a unique opportunity to explore international locations, gain a global perspective on art and design, and broaden understanding of other cultures and societies. Whether basking in the pastoral beauty of Lacoste, France, or immersing themselves in the bustling cityscape of Hong Kong, students encounter life-changing creative opportunities that enhance their SCAD experience.

GENERAL INFORMATION

OVERVIEW

Students from all locations are encouraged to consider a short-term program. During this upcoming intersession between fall and winter quarters, seven credit-bearing opportunities are offered in captivating locations, from Lacoste, France to Hong Kong and Japan.

SELECTION CRITERIA

To be considered for SCAD study abroad programs, students must be in good standing with the university and maintain a 2.5 GPA. Class standing and seat availability in courses are also factors for acceptance. Several programs have additional application requirements that can be found in the pages that follow. In addition to submitting a completed application, students must have their course selections approved by their student success adviser via an advising confirmation form. Students will be prompted by the application system to upload this form. Those interested in applying should schedule an appointment with their adviser prior to completing an application.

HOUSING AND DINING

HONG KONG: Students will reside at the Gold Coast Residences. Participants may request up to two roommates of the same gender. SCAD Study Abroad cannot guarantee that all roommate preferences will be accommodated. Some meals will be included in the program fee; however, students will be responsible for some of their meals. The apartments at the Gold Coast Residences have fully equipped kitchens, so students can prepare their own meals or dine out.

LACOSTE: Students will reside in the residence halls of SCAD Lacoste. Participants may request up to three roommates of the same gender; however, because living spaces vary in size and capacity, SCAD Study Abroad cannot guarantee all roommate preferences will be accommodated. Meals in Lacoste are included in the program fee and served in dining facilities during common meal times each day.

OTHER CITIES: Students will reside in hotels and will be responsible for most of their own lunches and dinners.

PASSPORT

All participants are required to have a passport valid through June 30, 2020. Students must submit a valid passport by October 9 to the office of study abroad.

VISA


HONG KONG: At this time, U.S. passport holders do not need a visa to enter Hong Kong. Non U.S. passport holders, please check your duration-of-stay restrictions and requirements as the country issuing your passport may limit your stay in Hong Kong. Please note that citizens of MMT are not eligible for these programs due to timeline and visa restrictions.

FRANCE: France and the EU may require visas for entry. Please check your issuing country's requirement for France. At this time, U.S. passport holders do not need a visa to enter France.

JAPAN: Visas are generally not required for stays of up to 90 days. Please check your duration-of-stay restrictions and requirements as the country issuing your passport may limit your stay in Japan.

TRAVEL

Each program participant will arrange his or her own flight to and from the destination. Students should plan to book their travel after receiving official acceptance into the program. Arrival and departure cities will be included in the acceptance letter. Early check-in cannot be accommodated.

Going to the Source: Exploring Fragrance Production and Marketing

OVERVIEW

Discover the history of perfume and perfume-making techniques while exploring France. The excursion begins at SCAD Lacoste, where students will learn about this aromatic art form, from its origin to how it is made today. Students will then spend time in Grasse, visiting the factories responsible for turning the raw materials of fragrance into ingredients for the perfumer's organ. After experiencing Grasse, students will return to Lacoste where they will further explore the core components of fragrance marketing: brand name and logo development, scent development, the fragrance bottle, packaging and labeling, sampling and related marketing materials. Prior to the conclusion of the program, students will travel by high-speed train to Paris to visit the many retail points of distribution. These major luxury boutiques and department stores will give students insight about the latest techniques for the visual merchandising and promotion of perfume in today's modern fragrance industry.

Immersive Concept and Pitch Development for Animated Shorts

OVERVIEW

This distinctive offering is tailored to animation students, particularly thesis candidates and those focused on their senior projects. As students examine visual and narrative counterpoints, they will grow an understanding of the research and development process for making a short. The excursion will allow students to experience first-hand how to conduct location-based research that is key to the development of films. Students will further explore core components of experimentation by learning how top production studios conduct immersive-based research, studying exceptional industry techniques for film development and production, discussing and workshopping creative ideation with the application of real-world studio's roundtable process and gaining out-of-dorm experiences with cultural documentation for the development of successful commercial and festival-appropriate student films.

Uncovering the Influence of Textiles in Local Designs

OVERVIEW

Through this collaborative travel experience with fashion and fiber instructors, students will investigate the role of local resources in textiles, processes, environments and media of Hong Kong and Japan. Starting in Hong Kong and neighboring islands, with sketchbook in hand, they will record their journey. Venturing on to Tokyo and Kyoto, they'll meet curators, collectors, artists, designers and manufacturers while exploring Japan's rich social history and design culture. They'll also visit historic landmarks to understand the geographic culture of place and art museums to view significant artifacts and textile collections, and learn the fashion philosophies, trends and concepts of denim and silk in Asia's vintage markets.

PROGRAM

Comic Travel

OVERVIEW

Through visits to studios, galleries and publishing companies in Hong Kong and Tokyo, Japan, this course investigates the art and business of sequential art in Asia. Students will visit and consult with professional cartoonists and comic book companies. The production component of the medium, as it exists today in Japan, will be observed in detail. This excursion provides students with the opportunity to visit comics' publishing houses, participate in workshops with artists, visit professional mangaka (Japanese cartoonists) and attend talks and museums available only in Tokyo. Students will develop a Tokyo morgue file from drawings, photos, paintings and sketches to use for future reference. They will also create sequential pages and create a travel journal documenting their experience.
